Since retiring from politics he has lectured widely, on food reform, climate change, population sustainability and against proposals for an Australian Charter of THE Rights. MICHAEL **ROBOTHAM**

Michael Robotham grew up in small country towns that had more dogs than people and more flies than dogs He escaped in 1979 and became a cadet journalist on an afternoon newspaper in Sydney.

For the next fourteen years he wrote for newspapers and magazines in Australia, Britain and America. In 1993 he quit journalism to become a ghost writer, collaborating with politicians, pop stars, psychologists, adventurers and show business personalities to write their autobiographies. Twelve of these non-fiction titles were bestsellers with combined sales of more than 2 million copies.

His first novel The Suspect, a psychological thriller, was chosen by the world's largest consortium of book clubs as only the fifth "International Book of the Month", making it the top recommendation to 28 million book club members in fifteen countries. It has been translated into twenty-two languages, including some he's barely heard of.

His second novel Lost won the Ned Kelly Award for the Crime Book of the Year in 2005, given by the Australian Crime Writers Association. Michael's subsequent novels The Night Ferry and Shatter were both shortlisted for UK Crime Writers Association Steel Dagger in 2007 and 2008. I. More recently, Bleed for Me- Michael's sixth novel - was shortlisted for the 2010 Ned Kelly Award. His lateset novel is The Wreckage.



LOUIS DE **BERNIERES**

Louis de Bernieres, who lives in Norfolk, published his first novel in 1990 and was selected by Granta magazine as one of the twenty Best of Young British Novelists in 1993. Since then he has become well known internationally as a writer and his sixth novel Birds Without Wings, came out in 2004. Captain Corelli's Mandolin (1994), won the Commonwealth Writers' Prize for Best Novel. A Partisan's Daughter, was shortlisted for the Costa Novel Award and Notwithstanding: Stories from an English Village was published in Autumn 2009.

As well as writing, he plays the flute, mandolin clarinet and guitar.

JOHN PILGER

John Pilger has reported from all over the world, covering numerous wars, notably Vietnam. When he was still in his twenties, he became the youngest journalist to receive Britain's highest award for journalism, Journalist of the Year, and was the first to win it twice. Moving to the United States, he reported the upheavals there in the late 1960s and 1970s. He marched with America's poor from Alabama to Washington, following the assassination of Martin Luther King, and was in the same room when Robert Kennedy, the presidential candidate, was assassinated in June

His work in South East Asia produced a iconic issue of the London Mirror, devoted almost entirely to his world exclusive dispatches from Cambodia in the aftermath of Pol Pot's reign.

His numerous documentaries on Australia celebrated and revealed much of his own country's 'forgotten past', especially its indigenous past and

His latest film is The War You Don't See.



GILLIAN ARMSTRONG

Gillian Armstrong first garnered attention for her debut feature, My Brilliant Career, in 1979, about a female writer who chooses her career over marriage. At the film's release Gillian held the distinction of being the first woman to direct a feature-length movie in Australia in almost 50 years. Alternating between period pieces and edgy modern works, her films' often focus on human dramas and stories with a sense of hope and compassion. Her films and documentaries have screened at numerous international film festivals including Berlin, Singapore, Sundance and Cannes. Gillian has received an AM for services to the Australian Film Industry, a Doctor of Letters from the University of NSW, an Honorary Doctorate in Film from Swinburne University and in 2008 the Women In Hollywood Icon Award in recognition of her contribution to the film industry.



Festival Site

North Beach (formerly known as Byron Bay Beach Resort) is located at the end of Bayshore Drive in the Arts & Industrial Estate. If you are coming from Byron Bay town go approximately 2km along Ewingsdale Rd from the town centre towards the Pacific Highway then turn right at Bayshore Drive (there is a BP Ozigo on the corner of Bayshore Dr and Ewingsdale Rd). If you are coming from the Highway you will need to turn left at BP Ozigo petrol station after approximately 2km.

How to access North Beach

Bus: There is a regular Xcede shuttle bus service from Byron Bay to the Festival site. The cost is \$3 each way.

The pick-up points for Xcede Festival bus will be:

- Shirley St
- Apartments Inn (Fletcher St)

- Byron Bay Bus Terminal (Jonson St, outside the Byron Visitors' Centre)
- Taxi rank (Jonson St)

We encourage visitors to use the bus service as parking is limited.

Car: The Festival site is an 8 minute drive from the centre of Byron Bay. Car parking on site is limited. If driving we recommend arriving 45 minutes before Festival entry. There will be a \$5 daily charge for parking on site, all proceeds go directly to the school literacy program.
