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

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



Laurel Cohn: **Understanding story** structure

A story is like a creature. It can have a multitude of limbs and unusual features, but it needs to be able to stand on its own and deliver its creator's intent. Being able to identify the backbone of your story is crucial to help you work out whether you have unwanted growths that need to be excised or require additional material needed for balance. In my experience as a developmental editor, structural issues are common.



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








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Festival Information

Festival Site

North Byron Events (formerly known as North Beach) is located at the end of Bayshore Drive in the Arts & Industrial Estate. If you are coming from Byron Bay town go approximately 2km along Ewingsdale Rd from the town centre towards the Pacific Highway then tum right at Bayshore Drive (there is a BP Ozigo on the corner of Bayshore Dr and Ewingsdale Rd). If you are coming from the Highway you will need to turn left at BP Ozigo petrol station after approximately 2km.

How to access North Byron Events

Bus: There is a regular Xcede shuttle bus service from Byron Bay to the Festival site. The cost is \$3 each way. The pick-up points for Xcede Festival bus will be:

- Shirley St
- Apartments Inn (Fletcher St)
- Byron Bay Bus Terminal (Jonson St, outside the Byron Visitors' Centre)

We encourage visitors to use the shuttle service as parking is limited.




Water at the Festival
